Flag Rules of Conduct / Flaggenregeln

Several student councils participating at FaTaMa and EMESCC own mascots, flags or symbols that are of high value to them. Over the past years, it has become a tradition that other councils try to snitch these objects. Therefore, the participating councils of the 2014 EMESCC in Munich and 2014 FaTaMa in Kaiserslautern agree on the following rules of conduct regarding this tradition. The following rules are in effect from now on until eternity.

1) Object of Desire and Snitching

Each student council is encouraged to bring a specific object of desire to the congress. It is the student council's responsibility to look after these objects and prevent theft. Other participants are allowed to snitch these objects while following legal restrictions (for example, stealing the object from a closed backpack or violence is prohibited). The objects of desire may not be hidden or locked up.

2) Treatment

The object must be treated with respect. The snitchers must prevent any harm and are responsible for damages or loss.

Every 24 hours, a picture proving the well-beeing of the object must be sent. The object of desire's high expectations regarding the supporting programme must be met, e.g. by taking it on a tour to relevant cultural objects, pubs and private events. Complying with this rule must be sufficiently documented.

3) Claim of Responsibility

Within 24 hours, the "thieves" claim responsibility and make demands for the return of the object. The demands must be of a rather symbolic value. Expenses must not exceed the cost of one crate of local beer.

4) Taking hostages

If the snitching student council also has an object of desire, the victims may try to snitch this object in return. If they succeed, the demands for the return must not be met. Instead, the objects must be exchanged as quickly as possible

5) Return

The exchange of prey or payment of the ransom must take place at a public space.
